Dr. Roy E. Lieuallen, president of OCE, recently announced the appointments of Robert J. Nadon as instructor in English, and of Dr. Donald Tibbitts as instructor in science. Both will begin their teaching duties in September.

Dr. Tibbitts received his BA in biology from Eastern Washington college of education in 1951, and his MA and PhD from Oregon State college in 1955 and 1957 respectively. He has worked in the fields of zoology specializing in anatomy and embryology; entomology and cytology. Mr. Nadon comes to Oregon from the general college at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, where he held the position of instructor in writing. He formerly taught English at East

high school in Denver, Colo.

Mr. Nadon received his BA and MA degrees in English literature and philosophy from the University of Minnesota in 1949 and 1952, respectively. He was awarded a BS degree in English and social science from the same institution in 1954.

Summer Registration Shows Small Drop

Jack D Morton, registrar at Oregon College of Education announced this week that summer term registration closed Monday evening, June 24, with 600 students enrolled. This figure represents a 10% decrease in the enrollment figures of this same time last year. Registration is expected to increase as more students register in workshops during the regular summer session and the post session.

Of the 600 students attending OCE this term, 109 are graduate students and 491 are under graduates.

Volunteers Asked To Catch Crabs

Tomorrow at Yaquina Bay State Park OCE will hold a crab and fish day. This activity will feature sport and fun for all who participate. There will be bay fishing, crabbing, swimming, sunbathing, salmon fishing, beach combing and many other interesting and exciting activities for those who attend.

The first of the party will leave Monmouth so as to arrive at Newport not later than 7 a.m. They will set the first nets and will start the crabbing for dinner that will be held in the Yaquina Bay State Park at 2 p.m.

Cost Held To Minimum

The cost of this excursion has been held to a minimum so that no one will be eliminated from participating due to financial reasons. There will be a charge of 50 cents per person or \$1 per family to cover the rental fees for the boats, etc. This fee will entitle the participant to an equal share of all crab and fish caught. These sea foods will be cooked in the park and will be served as the central item to the sack lunches which the participants will bring.

If any one needs a ride there is a list posted on the bulletin board next to the book store of those who plan to attend and the room they have available in their cars.

This offers us an opportunity to study the latest developments in the field of education and to gain a few more grains of knowledge to carry back to the classroom in the fall, or allows us to continue our education so that we may all the sooner be prepared to set forth to do our part in the profession we have selected. It is only regrettable that so many of us come to OCE so strongly opinionated and biased.

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Medal Collection In Gallery Exhibit

The Oregon College of Education art department is currently featuring an exhibit of medals and portrait medals by the famous Coconut Grove medallist and sculptor, Theodore Spicer-Simson. The exhibit will be on display until Friday, July 26. There are 181 medals included in the collection including portrait medals of George Bernard Shaw, William Howard Taft and Franklin D Roosevelt. All the works are in bronze.

The collection was secured on loan for exhibition by arrangements made by Mrs Pearl Heath, director of the OCE art department, with Dr C R Dolph, director of the Maryhill museum of fine arts in Maryhill, Wash.

Mr. Spicer-Simson has won many awards on his medals, including the National Sculpture Society's Mrs. Louis Bennett prize. The award was made for a case of 12 medals entered in the society's exhibition of small sculptures and medallions at New York City in 1955.

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Concert Fiddler To Appear at Assembly

Fiddler Beers, America's only concert fiddler, will appear in concert at OCE's weekly assembly on Tuesday, July 9. Mr. Beers will provide a program of violin folk music from all over the world.

Among the unusual accomplishments of Fiddler Beers is the playing of an ancient musical instrument known as the dulcimer or psaltery. Ancestor of the piano, the dulcimer does not have a keyboard, but is played by plucking the strings with the fingers, or by striking them with mallets.

These regular weekly assemblies are open to the public. The program which is held in Campbell hall auditorium starts at 11 a.m.

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DEAR OCE STUDENTS:

In June of 1956, the 8521st Air Reserve Squadron (Navigation Training) was former to refresh and advance the skill and proficiency of ex-air force navigators. In the past, a navigator had no great opportunity in a reserve unit except as a ground officer. The Korean conflict clearly demonstrated the need for a reserve supply of proficient navigators. Thus, in early 1955, 18 reserve navigation training squadrons were set up in the United States with their own function that of training the reserve navigators. The 8521st Air Reserve Squadron (Navigation Training) is now manned by five permanent party navigators instructors, and four mission pilots. All of the administration is handled by the active air force personnel, so that the reserve is not saddled with a lot of small details while out on a week-end. At present we have approximately 20 navigators assigned to our squadron with more awaiting orders.

In behalf of the 2343rd Air Reserve Flying Center, the permanent party who support the 8521st Air Reserve Squadron (Navigation Training) and the other reserve navigators, let me extend an invitation for you to visit our organization on any of the first two week-ends of each month at Building T-733C, and see just how we function. Feel free to bring your wife and we can probably sell her on the idea if we can't sell you.
