## Swimming Pool To Be Constructed by Fall

A new addition to the OCE campus next fall will be the Wolverton Memorial swimming pool. A bequest of approximately \$75,000 from the will of the late Grant S. Wolverton will be used to construct the pool. Mr. Wolverton graduated from OCE in 1883.

A committee decided to select the pool as a memorial to Mr. Wolverton's parents, John and Mary Wolverton who were pioneer residents of Monmouth. John Wolverton was a trustee of the early Christian College, predecessor of OCE. The Wolverton family lived for many years on the present OCE campus in the residence now in use as the music hall.

The Wolverton Memorial Pool will be constructed as an addition on the west side of the physical education building at the college. The building will be covered to permit all-year use of the pool for swimming instruction and recreation.

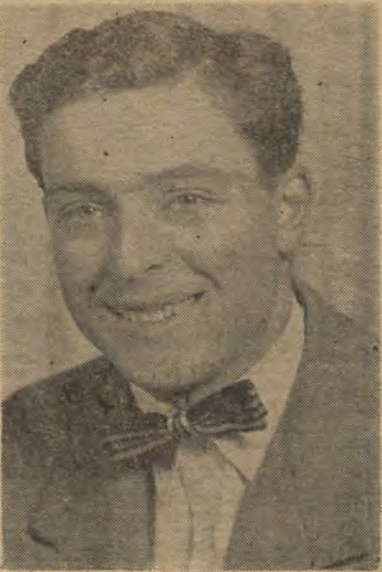

## Pros and Cons in Regard To Changing OCE's Name Given

OCE, or not OCE; that is the question!! Now that Oregon College of Education is broadening its curriculum to include other fields of study in addition to education, there is some talk about the campus that another name might be more suitable for the college.

It is felt by some that if the word "education" is allowed to remain in the title, there might be some otherwise prospective students who would not consider coming to OCE because of the indication that it is still only a teachers' training school.

Joan Seavey, dean of women, remarked that among persons in the education field "the connotation for education is not exclusive, or inclusive." In other words, they have broadened their concept of the term to include other areas besides teacher-education. However, she feels that if the term "education" actually prohibits some students from seeking admission, then the name should be changed to one which would include all students.

A similar opinion is held by Ed Montgomery, student body president, who said, "A new name would possibly help to bring more students to the campus." His personal feeling is that the name will eventually be officially changed, perhaps within the next five years.

Dr. Floyd Albin, acting registrar, feels that there is a good possibility of having the name changed if there is enough agitation, and he sees no reason why it should not be changed. However, as a worker in the education field, he is somewhat personally reluctant to see the emphasis on education taken away.

Of the several suggestions made in regard to a new name, the one which has received the most discussion is the idea of simply shortening the title to Oregon College. Some indication of future confusion resulting from this change-over is already evidenced in Lamron inconsistencies. Staff editors and writers who favor OC have been using that abbreviation while others still stick to the official and traditional OCE.

Miss Seavey expressed the feeling that the name Oregon College might become too easily confused with Oregon State college. Other proposals are, College of Oregon, Western Oregon college, and Campbell State college.

The actual possibility of having OCE's name changed is not entirely remote. Considerable "red tape" would be involved, of course, but it could be done. The movement would, most likely, begin with the students, themselves, possibly in the student council.

Ed Montgomery offered the suggestion of having a committee of student, faculty, and administrative representatives discuss the problem before bringing it to a vote of the entire student body.

Once the program has been completely outlined it would have to proceed through the President's office to the State Board of Higher Education, and eventually to the State Legislature.

Although it may appear unnecessary to go through so many steps in order to secure a change in the title of the college, Miss

Seavey pointed out that the students of one generation should not have the sole say in changing the name of a school which will be attended by students in generations to come.

Ed Montgomery, ASOCE president, was elected president of Theta Delta Phi, men's scholastic honorary, at their national convention held on the OCE campus Friday and Saturday, April 16 and 17. Roy E. Lieualen, OCE registrar on sabbatical leave, was re-elected treasurer of the group.

Other officers who were elected to serve from 1954 to 1956 are Boyd Gibson, SOCE, vice-president; and Albie Beck, State Department of Education, secretary.

Eugene Blair, OCE senior, has been historian for the past two years; Dr. H. Kent Farley, associate professor of education, has served as vice-president; and Dale Harp, ASOCE president-elect, as district governor.

Present at the convention were representatives from Theta Delta Phi chapters at SOCE, EOCE and the hosting OCE Beta chapter.

Jim Anderson, Elmer Summerfield, Darrel Lunda, Dan Rempel and Morris Culver were formally initiated into Theta Delta Friday afternoon in Maple hall.

Real sharp talent and all-around depth enabled the Willamette Bearcats to down the Oregon College cinder crew on the Salem oval Tuesday, 99-32. Bill Arnold clipped one second off his own school low hurdle record to bring the big news of the day, Monmouth wise.

Bill, who was barely nipped by Larry Standifer in the high hurdles, edged out the Willamette ace of the sticks in the lows for his :25.7 record. Arnold had established the old mark of :25.8 last year.

Frank Grove continued in his undefeated status in the javelin with a toss of 158' 4". It was Frank's fourth win of the current campaign.

The third and last first place garnered by the OC crew was picked up by Don McKenzie who jumped 21' 1/2" in the broad jump. Don was barely nipped in two other of his favorites, the 100 and 200 yard dashes. Bill Van Horn, WU sprint ace, tied the Willamette school record in the century and copped the 220 in :22.3. McKenzie bagged a third in the high jump.

Though he was unable to place in the event, Duane threw his best shot put of the year at 40' 8". Jim Riggs placed second in a right sharp half mile and rated a third in the 440.
